A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF WILLIE L. SHAW, JR.



The books have been closed on another year and the Shreveport Police Department is proud to announce 2011 will go down as the second lowest year for crime in over 36 years.

Many major categories of crime decreased in 2011. Homicides decreased 37 percent with 20 homicides investigated in 2011 as compared to 30 homicides investigated in 2010. Crime statistics records on hand dating back to 1970 show the next lowest year was 1976 when there were 27 reported homicides investigated. Purse snatching numbers plummeted 25 percent last year and we also saw a 15 percent decrease in auto thefts as compared to the 2010 totals.

As an organization, we are always implementing new strategies to further reduce crime in Shreveport. A new four officer Warrants Unit was formed specifically focused on clearing out a backlog of warrants. These officers vary their hours and change their work patterns to improve their chances of putting these wanted fugitives behind bars.

Adding to this effort, we conducted several IMPACT (Intelligence Led Multi-Pronged Assault on Crime Trends) operations during the year in neighborhoods throughout the city. Operation IMPACT is a community-based, proactive effort using officers from all divisions of the police department to address emerging crime patterns. It is unique in that the focus of the operation can change instantly to address emerging crime patterns. Utilizing

special funds authorized by Mayor Cedric Glover and the City Council, additional officers were assigned throughout the year to address emerging crime patterns. As a result of those efforts, 18,123 offenders were arrested, an increase of 11 percent over 2010.

Our Robbery Intervention Detail (RID) is another ongoing initiative. Business robberies reported during the holiday season dropped to lows not seen in recent years. Operation TBONE (Take Back Our Neighborhoods Everyday) and the Community Response Unit continue to be an integral part of our constant attack on crime.

Mayor Glover and our City Council have, without a doubt, made fighting crime priority one. When I was hired in 1990, the Shreveport Police Department had 429 positions allocated for sworn officers and a budget of 16.3 million dollars. Today, 22 years later, we have 578 sworn positions and a budget of over 54 million dollars. Our city government has been supportive of the police department and they are completely committed to making Shreveport an even safer place to live, work, and play.

I appreciate our relationships with other agencies as well and the assistance we receive from the Shreveport City Marshal's Office, the Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office, the Caddo Parish District Attorney's Office, the Louisiana State Police, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the United States Marshals Service, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives, and the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Community policing is a top priority and we will continue to work closely with Neighborhood Watch groups and other community organizations. There are more Neighborhood Watch groups and neighborhood associations here than ever before and I can say without hesitation they have played a major role in our crime-reduction strategies. The most important partnerships we have forged are with the very people we have sworn to serve and protect.

While the decreases in crime are quite impressive, there is still much work to be done. I understand only too well that in each one of those reported crimes there is a victim who has suffered some kind of loss. I am very concerned about those victims as well as the perception of crime in our city. We will continue working very hard to address not only crime, but the perception of crime.

The Shreveport Police Department is always looking forward and 2012 will be no exception. I am extremely proud of the courageous men and women who make up the Shreveport Police Department. It is because of their dedication and commitment to duty that our city has one of the finest police departments in the country.

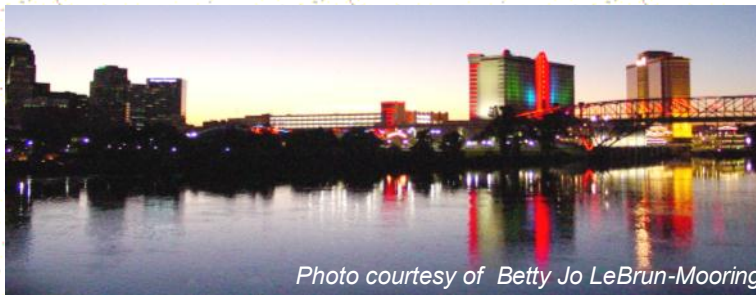

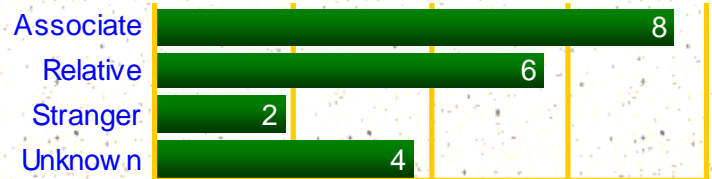

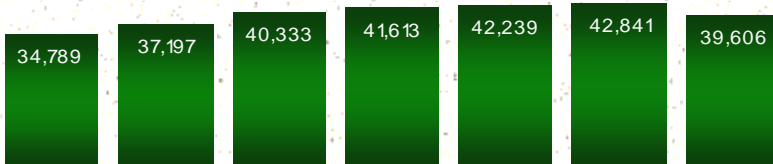

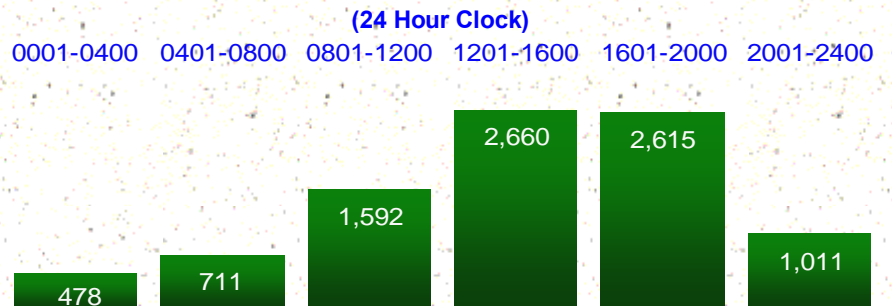

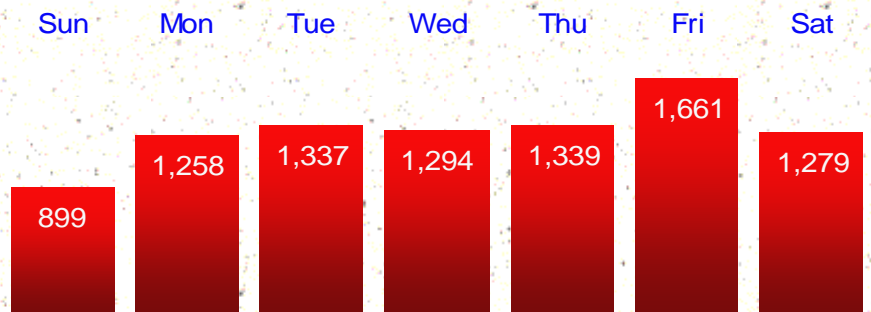

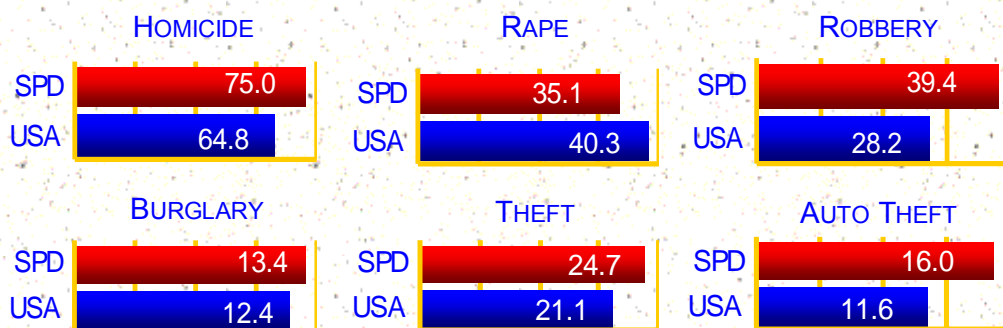

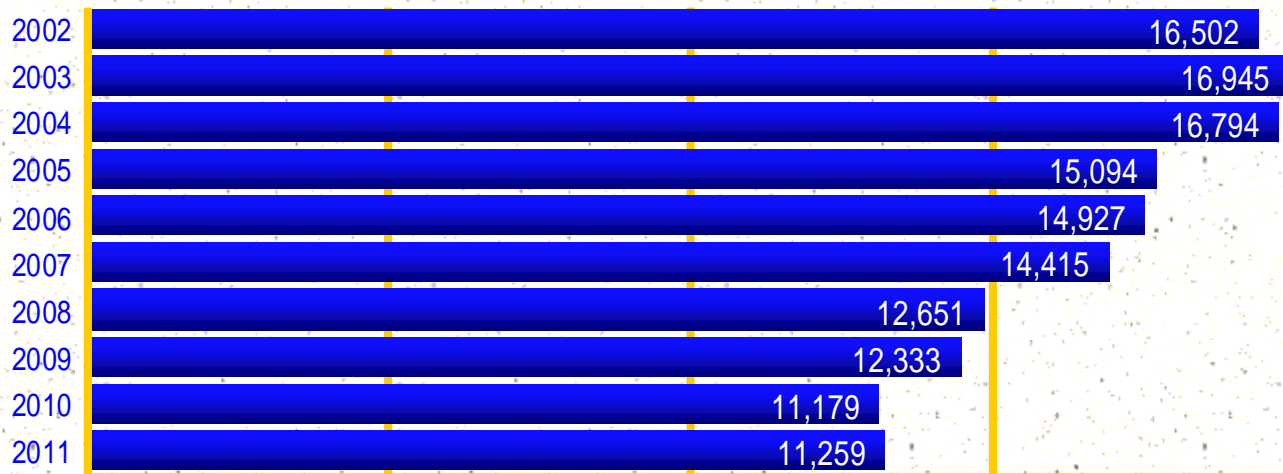

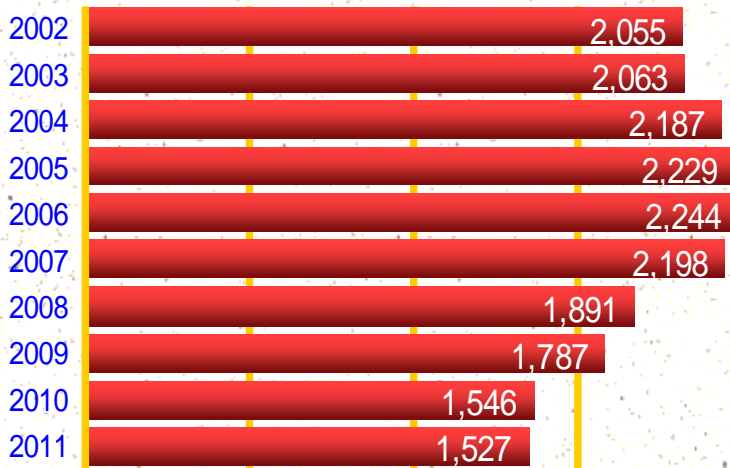

PART I CRIME INDEX

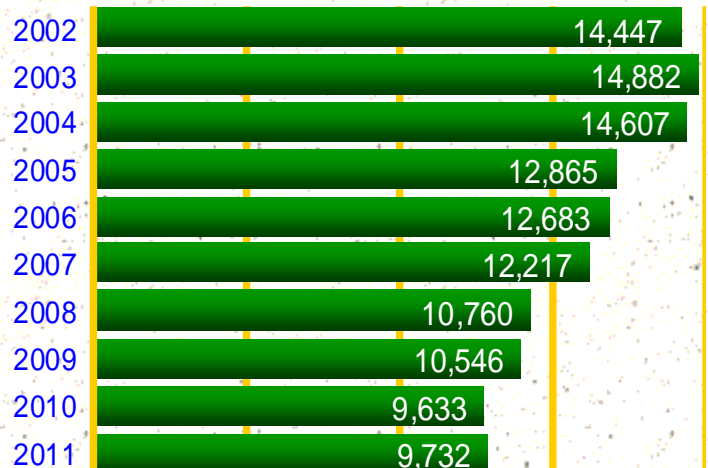


The Shreveport Police Department classifies and reports its criminal statistics according to UCR guidelines. The Uniform Crime Reporting program is administered by the FBI and gauges crime fluctuation nationwide. Over 16,000 agencies participate in this program. To keep the data consistent throughout these agencies, UCR sets up guidelines for classifying and submitting data. This enables the different agencies to compare each other and to rank areas according to their crime. This program also designated seven offenses as an index to measure crime and group these offenses under Part I Crime. These offenses are violent crimes and prevalent property crimes. These indexes are used by most agencies to measure their fluctuation in crime.

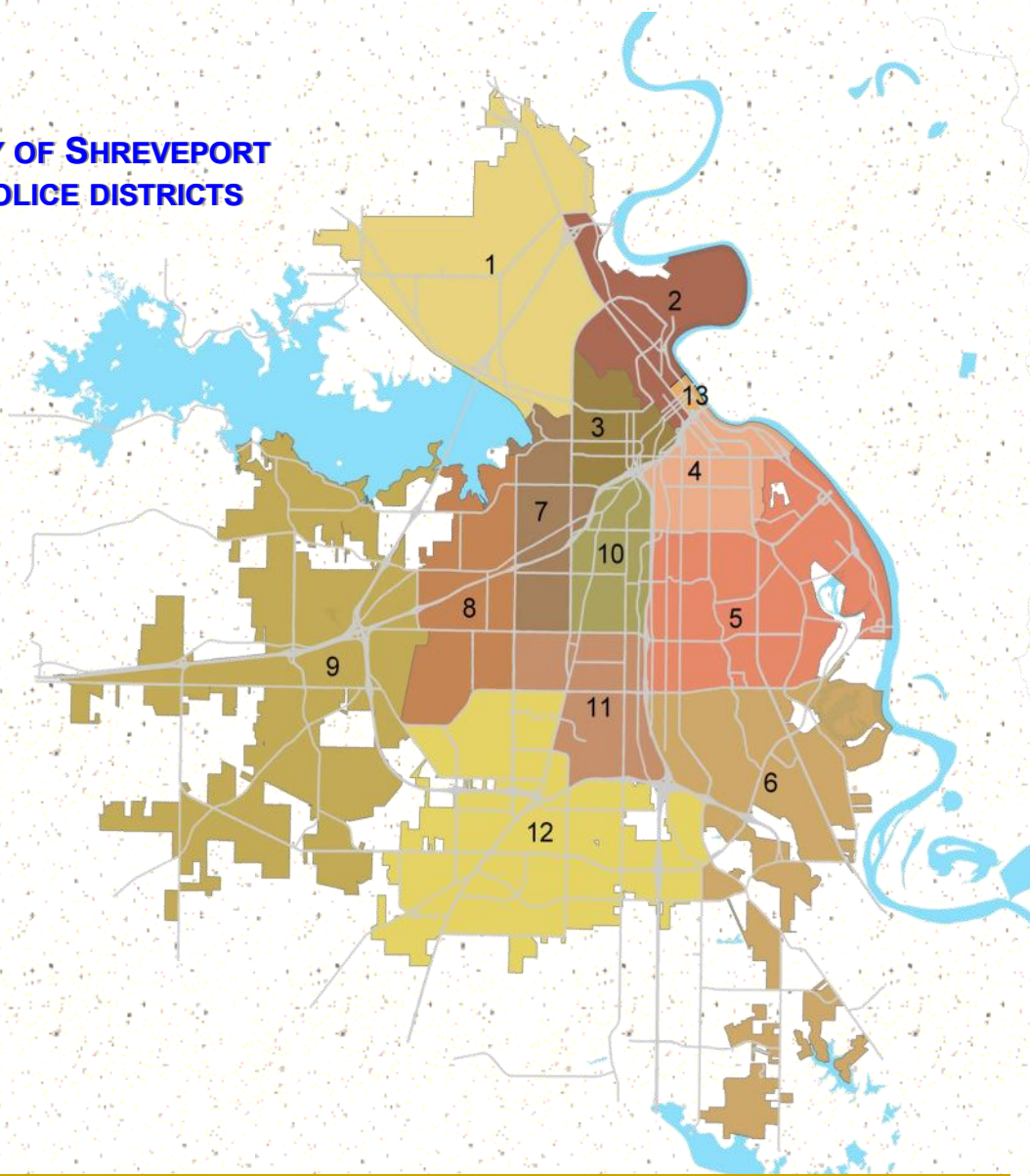
